

Actor Works In Store For Money To Get Married

PACIFIC PALISADES, Calif. (AP) — Married life holds such an allure for Bobby Driscoll, actor, that he's going to become Bobby Driscoll, store clerk, to finance it.

It seems that being an actor isn't the most lucrative way for a 20-year-old soon-to-be married male to spend his time.

"I can't afford to be just an actor," Driscoll, a child star 10 years ago, explained Friday. "I've got a job selling clothes in a haberdashery in Pacific Palisades — It's a good job. I like it."

Cause of all this industry is a 4-foot, 11-inch girl with black, curly hair. Her name is Marilyn Jean Rush, she's 19, and she's not in the movies.

"She's just a girl," he said. "She's not working, or going to school — She's just going to my wife."

Driscoll said that he and Marilyn will be rewed next week. "Yes, rewed," he said. "We were married last December in Mexico. We kept it a secret for a while. But neither her parents nor mine went for it, so we've been living apart since then."

Bobby signed a contract calling for \$300 a week at the age of 12 and played in 16 pictures. Among them were starring roles in "So Dear to my Heart" and "Treasure Island." For the last three years he has been doing most of his work on television.

"I'll keep on acting," he said. "It pays more than clerking, but I can't find enough work to keep busy. And for now what counts is to make it steady — to be able to bring home \$75 or \$80 each week."
